
Million-dollar makeover

Building restored to former glory

Peggy List knew she had a challenge on her hands when she was asked to pick the colors for the exterior of a 107-year-old building in downtown Burlington.

She had nothing to go on when she was hired to help renovate the Hall Block building at the northwest corner of College Street and South Winooski Avenue, a \$1 million project. Her husband, Paul List, was contracted by Redstone Commercial



Group to do the restoration work.

List's challenge was to envision the building as it was years ago. She wanted to be true to the building's history, but it had been altered over the years.

List sized up the building from different angles and in different light. She studied other historic brick buildings in the city.

She did research. Built by George Hall in 1894, the four-story building was home to his furniture
